Phonics

Thank you to all the parents who attended the phonics talks this week. It was wonderful to see so many of you and we hope the session was informative and helpful. The purpose of the afternoon was to give an overview of how we teach phonics and introduce reading at Broadhurst. For those of you who were unable to attend, below is a summary of what was presented.

Broadhurst School follows a unique programme primarily adapted from 'Jolly Phonics' where each sound is supported by an action, visual cards, story and song.

The first step to phonics is awareness - listening to sounds, hearing and saying letter sounds. This involves speaking and listening games, rhymes and alliteration.

Next, children are introduced to the Alphabet sounds - recognising, saying and hearing letter sounds.

Then two and three letter sounds are taught:

'Friendly letters' – double letter sounds e.g. ss – kiss, II- hill, zz- jazz. Children are taught that when they see two letters that are the same you only say the sound once.

Diagraphs – double letter sounds, then triple letter sounds. Consonant diagraphs are taught first e.g. th, sh, ch as they can be found at the start and end of a word. This is followed by vowel diagraphs e.g. ai, ea, oi.

To further support progress in reading, children learn 'Tricky Words' - words that are difficult or impossible to blend and therefore require repeated revision to learn by sight. Practise with your child regularly as this will aid their reading and writing skills. Try to make this as fun as possible! We want children to develop a love of reading and to develop their understanding of stories. Keep reading to your child and enjoying bedtime stories. Talk about the characters and events and make reading fun and enjoyable.

Help at Home

- Practise letter sounds.
- Challenge the children to find objects that begin with a certain sound.
- Play 'I Spy' with phonemes not letter names.
- Play rhyming bingo and extend rhyming strings.
- Work at your child's pace and give lots of encouragement.
