PACIFIERS (DUMMIES) AND SPEECH DEVELOPMENT

Many parents use a pacifier to help soothe their child. This is understandable as most babies have a strong sucking reflex and, for this reason, a pacifier can help settle a new born.

However, prolonged use beyond twelve months, may cause potential risks to the development of speech and language.

Overuse of a pacifier can have an impact on:

 The development of babbling, an important early stage in learning to talk.

 Development of the full range of tongue movements, important for sounds including t, d and l.

• Tongue position and pattern of tongue movements making speech sounds unclear, such as, the sounds s and sh.

• Gaps between the upper and lower front teeth which may lead to a lisp, making sounds like s, and z difficult.

• A reduced desire to communicate as with a pacifier in the mouth, some young children may become less likely to seek out talking activities.



Increased dribbling – some children may find it difficult to get good lip closure because of the pacifier and may have more saliva dribbles and slushy sounding speech.

Whist many children wean themselves off the use of a pacifier, for others it is not easy. Begin by using the pacifier less and less for comforting during the day.

One way to do this is to put the pacifier away in a special place, then get it out only as part of their sleep routine. Next, gradually use the pacifier less and less when re-settling during the night.

For example, give the pacifier every second time they cry in the night on day two, then every third time on day three, and so on.

Once a child is coping for longer periods without their pacifier, set a time and date to stop using a pacifier, including the child in the process.

For example, mark the occasion by the child giving the pacifier away to their favourite character or someone in need and celebrate with a special reward.
