SCREEN-FREE GAMES

Looking at screens for extended periods of time impact on children's intelligence, sleep, mental health, diet, behaviour and vision. Interventions to reduce screen time have a better chance if introduced early.

Simple board and card games are a great tool for spending quality family time together. They provide an opportunity to strengthen relationships and the sense of belonging. This chance to interact as a family in a positive way strengthens communication, cooperation and social skills.

Simple games can help your child learn colours, shapes, counting skills, letters, orientation and direction.

Simple games support your child to develop:

- hand-eye coordination and dexterity
- language and communication skills
- an increased attention span
- team work and an understanding of taking turns
- resilience when things do not go their way
- · problem solving and decision making skills
- concentration and memory
- patience and determination


Board games help to develop many visual, perceptual, cognitive and thinking skills. For example, moving counters teaches spatial awareness. This helps to train the higher functions of the brain. Fine motor skills and good hand-eye coordination are key to handwriting and other areas that require dexterity and precision, including typing. Games also involve clear rules, supporting your child's ability to follow instructions.
