Mark-making is when children make intentional lines, symbols, shapes and patterns using a variety of tools and materials. Mark-making is one of the first steps within a child's writing journey and should be celebrated and encouraged.

At first, mark-making can simply look like lines and scribbles on a page, however, these seemingly random marks are in fact our children becoming emergent writers. As children develop confidence in mark-making, they begin to understand that their marks can communicate meaning. This is when they begin to provide their own meaning to their marks, for example, drawing a line and saying, "This is mummy."

Mark-making not only supports writing but also mathematical development as children find ways to interpret their understanding of numbers and amounts using their own marks and symbols.



How can we support mark-making?


- Mark-making includes many different tools including, paintbrushes, chalk, pens, sticks, crayons and felt tips.
- Mark-making doesn't always happen on paper but in a variety of materials such as sand, mud, playdough and flour.
- We can encourage mark-making by ensuring children have access to markmaking materials and experience a variety of resources.
- · We can model writing to our children and demonstrate that writing can be used for many different things including, shopping lists, recipes, letters and cards.
- We can praise and celebrate children's marks.
- We can ensure that we nurture a child's love of mark-making and eventually writing by not forcing children to do tedious and unnecessary writing tasks.
- · We can give children the time to experiment with different materials and show interest in their marks.
