LET'S TALK ABOUT THE CURRICULUM

JOINING MATERIALS BOX MODELLING


Box modelling is an activity in which children use recycled materials to create a model or an object. This could be a robot, using a cardboard box or a car, using a shoe box and bottle lids.

What are the benefits of this play?

Open-ended resources- often recycled materials such as boxes can be made into anything you want, it's an open-ended resource which sparks imagination and creativity.

It promotes problem-solving skills- How will I attach this yoghurt pot to the top of my robot? How can I make my rocket ship stand up? These questions and many more might be considered during box modelling and this encourages problem-solving and children to overcome challenges.





It encourages discussion- when playing with box modelling, children are encouraged to discuss their process and reasons for choosing a particular item.

It is sustainable play- it encourages a discussion about recycling and reusing materials.

How to encourage Box modelling:

Collect a variety of items such as cardboard boxes, tissue rolls, plastic cups and bottles, yoghurt pots, bottle lids and tissue paper.

Provide resources to cut, stick and glue the items together.

To extend the activity, include items such as Googly eyes, tin foil, buttons or additional craft materials.

Try to keep the activity open by asking open-ended questions including, "What can you make?"

If children are new to box modelling, they may need some prompts and guidance through the activity.

What might you make at home with your recycling materials?

the children had a great time ordering numbers up to five by parking cars in their relevant parking spaces and recognising pictorial numbers.









IN THE GARDEN..
