LET'S TALK ABOUT THE CURRICULUM

BUILDING NUMBER SENSE

Number sense describes a child's ability to understand and use numbers practically. It develops a deeper understanding of numbers and provides a solid foundation for a child's mathematical journey.

To develop number sense we develop the skills to:

Use one-to-one correspondence

Children understand that numbers represent amounts and when counting, they give each object a number. For example, counting a line of toys and using their fingers to move or point to each object in turn.

Number identification

Children recognise and name numerals.

Ordering numbers

Children understand that numbers come in a particular order, e.g. 1,2,3,4,5.

Cardinality

Also known as the 'cardinal principle'-children know that when counting, the last digit they say identifies how many are in the set.



Subitising

Children can look at a small number of objects and know instantly how many are in the set without the need to count.

Matching numbers and quantities

Children can match a number of objects to the correct numeral.

How can we support a deeper number sense?

Providing children with plenty of opportunities to explore, arrange and play with numbers supports their understanding.

Children can develop their mathematical thinking when playing with loose parts as they group and organise them.

Children can develop an understanding that numbers don't always identify an amount. For example, there are numbers on buses, front doors and car number plates that don't identify an amount but instead are used as names or labels.

They painted pictures of chicks and discussed photos of other animals that are born during spring. The children have also particularly enjoyed our Post Office role-play area where we have been carrying out deliveries and making phone calls in the sorting office.







IN PHONICS...

we introduced the sound 'n' and looked at a variety objects beginning with this sound. We also practised our letter formation by tracing our names and beginning to write some letters independently.

IN MATHS...

we compared the height of towers and beanstalks using appropriate language, as well as sequencing them in order from shortest to tallest.
