**ROLE PLAY IN** 

# THE EARLY YEARS

At Broadhurst, every classroom has a role play corner. This can range from a doctors surgery, a post office, a hairdressers or an airport; the possibilities are endless. Role play corners help children to develop many important life skills and support their emotional and social development.

#### What are some of the benefits of role play activities in the early years?

Role play allows children to take on a particular role and step into someone else's shoes. This helps to support empathy and understanding. Using their imagination to take on a character can support children to ask questions such as, how would I feel if? What would I do next? For example, if pretending to be a doctor, how might you talk to the patient?

Role play helps to support children's imagination and nurtures their creativity.

Engaging in role play helps children to develop their social language and new vocabulary.

Role play allows children to relive familiar experiences, for example, children remember the time they went to the hairdressers or airport. Children can recall their own experiences and replay them in

a safe and nurturing space. Additionally, this aids understanding as children can find solutions to problems they may have encountered in real life, for example, being a little afraid at the doctors or dentist.

Role play is a fantastic opportunity to develop number sense. Children may use money to pay for items in the toy shop or share out the slices of cake in the cafe.

What are some easy role play set ups that can be done at home?

#### SHOP

If you have a toy till or a calculator then you can set up a quick role play shop at home. You can have a toy, book or clothes shop using items you already have. You can make price labels and use old shopping bags to support the play. Don't forget the receipt!

#### **KITCHEN**

Using old utensils, pots and pans is a very quick way of making a cafe or restaurant role play.

#### **DENS AND SHELTERS**

Creating dens with large material and canopies can provide children with endless opportunities. Keeping the den open ended means the children will use their imagination and share their own ideas. Have fun pretending!
