LET'S TALK ABOUT THE CURRICULUM

BY MRS ROBERTS EARLY READING - ORAL BLENDING

When teaching phonics, we begin with Phase One. This phase concentrates on listening skills and the distinction between different sounds. A part of this, is oral blending.

What is oral blending?

Oral blending is when we verbally break up a word into its individual letter sounds. We emphasise each separate sound in the word and then blend those sounds together. For example, c-a-t - cat.

Why is oral blending an important part of teaching early reading?

Oral blending develops phonological awareness and helps children to identify the different sounds in words. This supports the processes of early reading and writing.

How can we support oral blending?

Start by encouraging children to identify environmental sounds around them, for example, listening to the sounds they can hear on their walk to school or the park.

Clap the syllables in different words or the children's name.

Talk like a robot. Break up the individual sounds in everyday words, for example, please can you pick up the p-e-n.



Sound out the words- start with short three letter words, for example, pig, pen, car, pot or dog. Collect items or pictures in a box and ask the children to find the item you are saying but only using the sounds. For example, can you find the d-o-g? Saying the sounds individually will then encourage children to orally blend.

Oral blending takes time to learn and that is why children need lots of opportunities for plenty of quality talk, listening and phonics games.

Incorporating oral blending into the daily routine can help build phonological awareness and encourages children to blend sounds together in a safe and secure environment.

Have f-u-n blending!




CLASS 7 NEWS
