LET'S TALK ABOUT THE CURRICULUM BY MRS ROBERTS CHARACTERISTICS OF

CHARACTERISTICS OF EFFECTIVE LEARNING

The characteristics of effective learning are a central component in the world of early years education and go hand in hand with the 7 areas of learning. The characteristics of effective learning support children to become fully active learners who apply their skills and knowledge across a wide range of areas. Effective learning ensures children are independent, engaged, motivated to learn and can apply their skills.

The characteristics of effective learning are split into three categories, these are:

PLAYING AND EXPLORING

This includes:

- Finding out and exploring.
- Playing with what they know.
- Being willing to have a go.

By encouraging these characteristics, children will develop curiosity and be fully engaged in learning.





ACTIVE LEARNING This includes:

- Being involved and concentrating.
- Keep on trying.
- Enjoying achieving what they set out to do.

By encouraging these characteristics, children will be motivated and grow into confident learners.

CREATIVE AND CRITICAL THINKING This includes:

- Having their own ideas.
- Making links.
- Working with ideas.

By encouraging these characteristics, children will be deeper thinkers and ask questions that lead to further learning.

At Broadhurst, we support the characteristics of effective learning by providing an enabling environment. We ensure that children have plenty of opportunities to explore, discover and try new things. Through Table Time activities, we encourage active learning and concentration. We provide challenges so that children can persevere and feel proud of their achievements. We are also providing plenty of experiences in which children can use their critical thinking skills, from science experiments to problem-solving activities.

CLASS 4 NEWS BY MISS LUNA

This week Class 4 have been learning about objects that sink and float. They enjoyed sharing their ideas and experimenting with different objects.

Then they tried and predict whether the objects they chose would sink or float and it was wonderful to see how quickly they grasped the concept!

the children have been consolidating their counting skills. We have revised our one-to-one correspondence as well as matching numerals to quantities. Class 4 has certainly made huge progress as they showed to be able to count and match amounts independently. Well done, Class 4!











IN PHONICS..

A MESSAGE FROM V&ME

You will have seen the alarming report around the amount of <u>ultra processed food there</u> is in our baby and toddler's diets and <u>the potential implications</u>.


Snacks could be particularly tricky to get right, as most off the shelf options are heavily processed. We thought it'd be helpful to share Chef Kwesi's recipe for one of our most popular (and simple) snack: blueberry banana oat bar.

It only needs 4 ingredients (although we've also given you some ideas if you want to go the extra mile!) The actual making process is pretty straight forward and doesn't take too long so it could be a good one to make with your little ones at home.

You will notice that we never use any honey or sugar alternatives to sweeten our foods – whilst they can be seen as "healthier" options, they are still <u>free sugar</u> and we want to minimise the intake for children under 4.

4 Ingredients:

Rolled oats:1 cup

Blueberries:a handful (you can easily swap this to other berries) To spice it up, you can also add a touch of vanilla extra some cinnamon or a handful of chopped nuts

Banana: 1.5 ripe bananas



 If using a blender, blend bananas until smooth, add blueberries and pulse to break down a little. Alternatively, you can simply mash the banana very well (the better it's mashed, the better it can bind) and slightly chop the blueberries so it can distribute more evenly

- 2. Place all ingredients into a bowl and mix well
- 3. Line a small container (9.5' x 6.5') with baking paper and place mix inside
- 4. Press down, place another sheet of baking paper on top then another container on top (to press down and keep shape) but you can skip this step if you don't mind your bars slightly uneven
- 5. Cook in the oven at 165C for 25-30 minutes
- 6. Remove and press in the fridge overnight

7. Portion into 20g rectangle shapes and serve! You can always enjoy it straight away once it's cooled down but it may not hold the shape as well

Once made, they can last in the fridge for 2-3 days
